According to Kindergarten BOY IRLA data, 43% of K students were at the beginning Kindergarten reading level. Third grade has the lowest percentage of At Risk students at 29% and the highest percentage of Benchmark students at 35%, according to DIBELS Data for BOY 2020.	According to 1 st grade, 2 nd grade and 3 rd grade BOY IRLA data: 83% of 1 st grade students were below the beginning of year 1 st grade reading level, 73% of 2 nd grade students were below the beginning of year 2 nd grade reading level, and 81% of 3 rd grade students were below the beginning of year 3 rd grade reading level.
According to the CLASS 2019-2020 Pre-K Data, the total domain average for all PK teachers was 6.15 which is an increase of 0.29 from last year's total domain average of 5.86. According to the CLASS 2019-2020 Pre-K Data, the Instructional Support domain average for all PK teachers was 5.37 which is an increase of 0.99 from last year's Instructional Support domain average of 4.38. According to the Math District Readiness assessment, our average score for 1 st and 2 nd grade was 48.5% - while this is below 50%, it is much stronger than our ReadyGen (ELA) Baseline assessment average score.	According to the 3 rd grade LEAP 360 ELA Diagnostic, the average score was 33%.

1. Third grade students will increase their math assessment index score by 5% from 85.9 points to 90.2 points from Spring 2019 to Spring 2020 according to the LEAP 2025.	
2. Third grade students will increase the percent proficient in the ELA subcategories of Written Expression from 28% in Spring 2019 to 35% in Spring 2020 and Knowledge and Use of Language Conventions from 34% in Spring 2019 to 42.5% in Spring 2020 according to LEAP 2025.	
3. Third grade EL subgroup will increase their index score by 10% in ELA from 28.2 points to 31.0 points and in Social Studies from 23.6 points to 26.0 points from Spring 2019 to Spring 2020 according to LEAP 2025.
